


The Life of St. Patrick

- Dates: c. 390 c. 460
- Roman: Bannavem Tabernia (Wales?)
- Family:
 - * Calpornius (father) decurion and deacon
 - + Potitus (grandfather) priest
- Captured by Gaels and sold into slavery (six years)



The Life of St. Patrick

- Escaped Slavery in Ireland
- Returned to Britain and dedicated life to God (monk?)
- Called to Ireland in a vision c. 433
- Bishop?
- Established church at Armagh
- Muirchu's "The Life of St. Patrick" (c. 670) haigiography




Why Armagh?

Politics! Ulster Province


- Ascendancy of the Ulaid

What everybody "knows" about St. Patrick (but just isn't true)

Patrick and The Green

- St. Patrick is historically associated with the color BLUE!
- Green represents Ireland
- "Wearing of the green" refers to wearing a shamrock (i.e., republicanism)



Driving out the Snakes

- No native reptiles in Ireland
- Oillipheist ("great beast")
- Metaphor:
 - Druidism
 - Paganism
 - + Evil



Patrick and the Shamrock

- Metaphor of the Trinity
- Celts had triune gods:
 - + Eriu
 - * Morrigan
 - Bridgit



The Apostle of Ireland

- Palladius first bishop of Ireland (Celestine I)
- No apostolic endorsement


• Roman Model initially failed in Ireland

- Feast Day March 17 (death c. 460)
- Usually falls during Lent
- Acceptable to eat meat
- Spring Equinox?


St. Patrick's Day Modern

Pilgrimage on Croagh Patrick




Chapel on Croagh Patrick

Three "stations" along the route are circled with prayer.




Lugh's Mountain

The Legacy of St. Patrick


- The beginning of Irish literacy:
